Our Man Hoppe -

Can Nobody Win?

IN ALL DUE MODESTY, when it comes to politics, I have been known for the past 16 years as "The Brains behind Nobody."

Nobody in those 16 years of presidential politics, I'm proud to say, has consistantly won the support and respect of the American public. Among those eligible to vote, more citizens cast their ballots for Nobody every four years than for Goldwater, Johnson, Nixon, McGovern, Ford or Carter.

And, even more important, Nobody has kept his campaign promises.

And vote with confidence. Remember that old political adage: "You can't beat Somebody with Nobody." So what if it hasn't proved true these past 16 years?
